#### **Naviance**

Throughout the school year, students are learning about their strengths' themes and how to use their strengths toward personal success and goals. Although students have each of these strengths within themselves, certain themes have been identified as their top three strengths. What can parents/guardians do to help their COMPETING student learn and grow through strengths development?

Competitors may express strong emotions, win or lose. Affirm the feelings — happy or mad — by listening to the emotion. You may need to help them work through it. Understand that this emotion gives the competitor fuel. Arrange opportunities for them to measure progress or success. Introduce the concept of "personal bests" by tracking their best performance, score, or achievement to date. This could be something large or even an everyday activity, like the most minutes practicing the clarinet or the most pages read in a week.

# Policy Corner - Weapons (Policy 9250)

The presence of weapons on school property poses a serious threat to the safety and well being of students and staff. It is unlawful for any person to carry or possess any rifle, gun, knife, or deadly weapon of any kind on any public school property in the state of Maryland. A weapon, as defined by school system policy, includes: any gun, dirk knife, bowie knife, switchblade knife, star knife, buck knife, hunting knife, throwing star, razor, metal knuckle, Nunchaku, explosive device, or any other object or implement intended to cause harm to another or used in such a way as to cause harm to another. Any student found in possession of a weapon on school property will be suspended and the police notified. Possession of a gun, or any implement possessed under a circumstance that would reasonably lead a person to believe it was a gun, will result in expulsion.

# **Tips for School Success - Family Calendar**

**Post a family calendar in a central place.** Write down important school dates, including parent meetings, due dates for projects, and tests. Encourage your middle school student to add to the calendar and to check it daily.
